
With a small station and low call volumes, it is harder to bring in new people and train them without sharing them with other areas of the county for them to gain experience. That said, we have many more "openings" for people willing to train as Emergency Medical Technicians, Tanker and other drivers, and Firefighters, as well as administrative people to support the day-to-day operations of the station.

#### From the Chief:

The Philomont Volunteer Fire Department hopes that you and your family had a safe summer.

As the season transitions into fall, there are a couple of safety tips and other events you should be aware of:



- (2) The burn ban law changes Oct. 1. From Oct. 1 to Feb. 14, the burn ban permits you to burn tree debris (no construction materials or trash) see http://www.loudoun.gov/index.aspx?NID=820 for more information.
- (3) Now is the time of year to check and clean your chimney. Chimney fires can burn explosively noisy and dramatic with rumbling that sounds like a freight train or a low-flying airplane. Flames or dense smoke may also shoot from the top of the chimney. If you think you have a chimney fire, call 911.

Please do not hesitate to contact us for questions regarding these items or other topics regarding fire safety.

#### Safety Never Takes a Holiday

Chillier weather and the upcoming holidays pose a number of challenges safety-wise, and PVFD would like to offer a few reminders to help you safely enjoy the coming months.

#### **Heating Your Home:**

With colder temperatures, many people spend more time indoors and use fireplaces, wood stoves, space heaters and other heating methods such as cooking stoves to keep warm.

To ensure a fire-safe winter season, make sure furnaces and chimneys are professionally cleaned and smoke alarms are properly maintained.

#### Cooking:

- Unattended cooking equipment is the leading factor contributing to the ignition of larger spreading cooking fires.
- The highest incidences of cooking fires in residential buildings take place on Thanksgiving Day, followed by Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
  - If you are simmering, baking, roasting or boiling food, check it regularly and use a timer to remind you that you're cooking.

#### **Decorating:**

- Inspect holiday lights and other electric decorations each year for frayed wires, bare spots and excessive kinking or wear before putting them up. Connect strings of lights to an extension cord before plugging the cord into the outlet.
- Consider using battery-operated flameless candles, which can look, smell and feel like real candles. If you do use lit candles, make sure they are in stable holders, and place them where they cannot be knocked down easily.
